Colonel Todd Morrow, U.S. Army (Retired), served in numerous command and staff positions throughout his distinguished 26 year military career. His last assignment was as the Deputy Commander of the 32nd Army Air and Missile Defense Command (AAMDC) where he was responsible for the training and readiness of four of the Army's five Patriot brigades and both THAAD batteries. In addition, he was responsible for assisting US Army Forces Command (FORSCOM) and US Army Central Command (CENTCOM) in planning the force allocation and operational employment of the Army's Air and Missile Defense (AMD) resources.

Prior to that, he served as the commander of the 4th Battalion, 5th Air Defense Artillery Regiment (Renegades), of the First Cavalry Division. On the first anniversary of the attacks of September 11th, the Renegades, under COL Morrow's command, deployed to the National Capital Region (NCR) as the first unit given mission to provide air defense for the many key essential assets within our Nation's Capital as part of Operation Noble Eagle.

Upon battle handover of the Operation Noble Eagle mission, COL Morrow stood up Task Force Renegade and deployed to Baghdad, Iraq, where he was responsible for the security of the vital route that connected the Baghdad International Airport and the critical "Green Zone." During the Battle of Holy Week in April 2004, Task Force Renegade's heroic actions resulted in the unit being awarded the Valorous Unit Award.

COL Morrow holds a Bachelor's Degree from Presbyterian College, a Master's Degree in Administration from Central Michigan University, and a Master's Degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the United States Naval War College.

Awards include; the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Defense Meritorious Service Medal with Oak Leaf Cluster, and the Meritorious Service Medal with 6 Oak Leaf Clusters.
