SUBJECT: Memorandum of Instruction for the 1st Quarter, Fiscal Year 2017, Fort Sill Sergeant Audie Murphy Club Selection Board

1. References. US Army Forces Command (FORSCOM) Sergeant Audie Murphy Association (SAMA) Regulation 600-80-1, Sergeant Audie Murphy Award, dated 2 April 2015.
2. Purpose. Provide implementation instructions for the administration of the Fort Sill Sergeant Audie Murphy Club (SAMC) selection board.
3. General. Fort Sill will hold the Fires Center of Excellence, 1st Quarter (QTR), Fiscal Year (FY) 2017, Sergeant Audie Murphy Club Board **2-3 November 2016**. The Performance Test starts at the 1 Mile track located east of Building 5970 South Boundary Road (1st Battalion, 19th Field Artillery) NLT 0545 hrs. The Board will be conducted in the Regimental Conference Room (RCR) on the 3rd floor, 455 McNair Hall Avenue (McNair Hall). This is not a competition but an individual effort. Do not discuss or work with any other candidate during the selection board.
4. Eligibility. All Active Army, US Army Reserve and US Army National Guard Soldiers in the ranks of Corporal through Master Sergeant/First Sergeant, based on FORSCOM installations or attached to FORSCOM units, are eligible for the SAMA. ARNG Soldiers who are not in Title 10 status or assigned to a FORSCOM unit may compete for the FORSCOM SAMA while in Title 32 status upon approval of an exception to policy (ETP). The ETP must be submitted to CSM, US Army FORSCOM through the FORSCOM G-1, Sergeant Major (SGM). The ETP must be favorably endorsed by the State ARNG CSM. The ARNG SAMA board packet submitted to the FORSCOM CSM for award approval must contain evidence of compliance with all four phases of the SAMA selection process. Service members of other armed services may compete for the FORSCOM SAMA if they are assigned or attached to a FORSCOM unit in a joint coalition status. Specifically, candidates must meet the following requirements:
 - a. **The NCO must meet all Army Retention Standards.**
 - b. **The nominee has not received any Article 15's within two years.**
 - c. **Nominees who do not have direct supervision of Soldiers may submit proof of active participation in external leadership roles.**

d. Candidates must have attained at least 270 points without permanent profile or 170 points with a permanent profile on their latest Army Physical Fitness Test.

5. Selection Process:

a. The selection process for the SAMA will be executed in six (6) phases:

(1) Phase I – Senior NCOs Nomination/Evaluation and Performance: Senior NCOs for the award of SAMA will screen and evaluate candidates prior to appearance before an initial selection board. Recommendation will be presented to the board in the form of a written recommendation highlighting the following (Encl 1):

(a) Describe the NCOs leadership achievements and performance that merits special recognition.

(b) How has the NCO contributed to the development of a professional NCO Corps and a combat ready Army?

(c) How has the NCO exemplified leadership characterized by personal concern for the needs, training, development, and welfare of Soldiers and concern for families of Soldiers?

(2) Phase II - Initial Selection Board: An initial selection board conducted at Battalion level under the direction of the unit's senior NCO.

(3) Phase III - Intermediate Selection Board: A selection board will be conducted at the Brigade level under the direction of the unit's senior NCO. The board shall be comprised of voting members senior to the nominee. Nominees selected will continue by appearing before the final selection board.

(4) Phase IV – Performance Test: **0545 hrs, 2 November 2016**. The SAMA performance test will start at the 1 Mile track located east of Building 5970 South Boundary Road (1st Battalion, 19th Field Artillery) NLT than 0545 hrs. All candidates are responsible for identifying the test area prior to test day. Candidates will bring the SAMC Evaluation Grade Sheets worksheet with them the morning of. Each candidate will go through series of tasks to include; APFT (270 or above without permanent profile, or 170, or above with permanent profile), height and weight will be conducted immediately following the APFT inside Building 5970, the Written Essay, and Written Test will also be conducted inside Bldg 5970. Candidates will have an hour to complete the written exam and have to score a minimum of 80%; less than 80% will result in disqualification and the candidate will not continue on to the Essay Topic and Knowledge Board. Essay Topic will be issued 48 hours prior to the Performance Test. Candidates will have two hours to complete the written essay portion. At the end of the

two hours, essays will be collected and shared with the board members the following day.

****NOTE:** candidate can return for consideration at future SAMC Boards**

(5) Phase V - Final Selection Board: 1100 hrs, 3 November 2016. Selection board will take place in the Regimental Conference Room (RCR), 455 McNair Avenue (McNair Hall). Nominees must report with their sponsor no later than NLT 1030 hrs. The SAMC final selection board will be comprised of the CSM, USAFCOEFS, as the president and three or more Command Sergeants Major or Sergeants Major appointed by the president, and a recorder without vote. Nominees are required to have a unit sponsor, senior to them in grade/position and a member of the SAMC, present at the selection board. Nominees require a unanimous vote from the board members to be recommended for induction. The board president will verbally counsel candidates not selected for induction. The candidates selected for induction will be introduced to the local SAMC chapter and presented appropriate awards.

(a) Candidate Nomination packets: Nomination Packets for the Phase V Final Selection Board will be prepared IAW Enclosure 2 and hand-carried to McNair Hall, Bldg. 455, 1st Floor, Room 123 **NLT 1600 hrs. on 21 October 2016, LATE PACKETS WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. Brigade S-1 will submit FIVE complete packets in separate binders.** Candidates will hand carry their leaders book to the board.

(b) Uniform: Nominees will wear the Army Service Uniform (ASU) (Female with slacks only) with all awards and decorations. Sponsors will wear the Army Service Uniform (ASU) (Female with slacks only) with all awards and decorations. Board members will wear the Army Combat Uniform (ACU).

(6) Phase VI - Induction Ceremony: The SAMA induction ceremony, scheduled by the SAMC president, and distributed by G3. In the event that the proper documents are not received from the individual MACOMs, the induction portion may be rescheduled. Uniform for inductees is ASUs for all events, spouses, or guests are duty/business casual.

He entered the Delayed Entry Program in September then entered Active Duty in December 1982. He attended One Station Unit Training (OSUT) for 13E, Cannon Fire Direction Specialist at Alpha Battery, 4th Training Battalion, Fort Sill, Oklahoma.

SSG Doe is currently assigned to E Battery, 4th Battalion, 99th Field Artillery as the S-2 NCOIC. His previous assignments include C Battery, 2nd Battalion 37th Field Artillery, Headquarters, Fort Sill; B Battery, 2nd Battalion 39th Field Artillery, Larson Barracks, Kitzingen, Germany; Headquarters, B Battery 1st Battalion, 7th Field Artillery (Light), Fort Drum, New York and B Battery, 1st Battalion, 4th Field Artillery, Camp Pelham, Korea. (Enclosure 4) Biographical Narrative of Audie L. Murphy

Audie Leon Murphy was a legend in his own time. A war hero, movie actor, writer of country and western songs, and a poet; his biography reads more like fiction than fact. He lived only 46 years, but he made a lasting imprint on American history. Audie was born on a sharecropper's farm in North Texas on June 20, 1924. As a boy, he chopped cotton for one dollar a day and was noted for his feats of derring-do and his accuracy with a gun. He had only 5 years of schooling and was orphaned at age 16. After being refused enlistment during World War II in both the Marines and Paratroopers for being too small (5'5") and underweight (110 lbs), he enlisted in the U.S. Army a few days after his 18th birthday.

After basic training at Camp Wolters, Texas, and advanced training at Fort George G. Meade, Maryland, Audie was sent overseas. He was assigned to the famous 15th Infantry Regiment of the 3rd Infantry Division where he fought in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France, and Germany. He earned a battlefields commission for his courage and leadership ability as well as citations and decorations including every medal for valor that America gives. He was also awarded three French and one Belgian medal. Lieutenant Audie Murphy was the highest decorated soldier in American history.

Discharged from the Army on September 21, 1945, Audie went to Hollywood at the invitation of movie star James Cagney. He remained in California for the rest of his life and was closely associated with the movie industry, both as an actor and a producer. He acted in 44 films, starring in 39 of them. His best known film was "To Hell and Back," adopted from the bestselling book of his war experiences by the same name. Most of

his movies were westerns. In 1955, Audie Murphy was voted the Most Popular Western Actor in America by the Motion Picture Exhibitors. Audie wrote the lyrics to 16 country and western songs, the most popular of which was "Shutters and Boards," written with Scott Turner in 1962. The song was recorded by over 30 pop singers, including Jerry Wallace, Dean Martin, and Porter Waggoner. He was an accomplished poet; unfortunately, only a few of his poems have survived.

In 1950 Audie joined the 36th Infantry Division ("T-Patchers") of the Texas National Guard and served with it until 1966. He was a Mason and a Shriner and belonged to several veterans' organizations. Audie Murphy was killed in a plane crash on a mountain top near Roanoke, Virginia on May 28, 1971. Fittingly, his body was recovered 2 days later on Memorial Day. Audie could very well be the last American war hero. He was the greatest combat Soldier in the 200 plus year history of the United States.

2d Lt. Murphy commanded Company B, which was attacked by 6 tanks and waves of infantry. 2d Lt. Murphy ordered his men to withdraw to prepared positions in a woods, while he remained forward at his command post and continued to give fire directions to the artillery by telephone. Behind him, to his right, 1 of our tank destroyers received a direct hit and began to burn. Its crew withdrew to the woods. 2d Lt. Murphy continued to direct artillery fire which killed large numbers of the advancing enemy infantry. With the enemy tanks abreast of his position, 2d Lt. Murphy climbed on the burning tank destroyer, which was in danger of blowing up at any moment, and employed its .50 caliber machine gun against the enemy. He was alone and exposed to German fire from 3 sides, but his deadly fire killed dozens of Germans and caused their infantry attack to waver. The enemy tanks, losing infantry support, began to fall back. For an hour the Germans tried every available weapon to eliminate 2d Lt. Murphy, but he continued to hold his position and wiped out a squad which was trying to creep up unnoticed on his right flank. Germans reached as close as 10 yards, only to be mowed down by his fire. He received a leg wound, but ignored it and continued the single-handed fight until his ammunition was exhausted. He then made his way to his company, refused medical attention, and organized the company in a counterattack which forced the Germans to withdraw. His directing of artillery fire wiped out many of the enemy; he killed or wounded about 50. 2d Lt. Murphy's indomitable courage and his refusal to give an inch of ground saved his company from possible encirclement and destruction, and enabled it to hold the woods which had been the enemy's objective.
