



ABOUT RISK REDUCTION

The Risk Reduction Program is a Commander's Program designed to identify high risk soldier behavior and to assess soldier readiness at battalion/brigade level. Incident numbers are reported to the Risk Reduction Office on a monthly basis for the following: accidents, alcohol offenses, chapter eliminations, child abuse, courts martial, drug offenses, financial problems, positive UAs, STI's, spouse abuse, self harm/suicide attempts, deaths, AWOL, traffic violations, crimes against persons, crimes against property, number of UA samples shipped, housing warning letters, eviction notices, and disciplinary actions. This information is then broken down by Battalion/Brigade and presented to Commanders on a quarterly basis, making it easy to identify problem areas within their unit. Prevention options are then reviewed, presented, and discussed with Command.

Unit Risk Inventory Surveys (URIs) developed by the Department of the Army are administered to active duty Soldiers by the Risk Reduction Program. The URI is an **anonymous** questionnaire designed to screen for high-risk behaviors and practices that compromise unit readiness. The results are analyzed by battalion/brigade, NOT on an individual basis. The survey takes LESS than 30 minutes to complete. Once the surveys have been administered to a unit, they are sent to ACSAP for processing. The results are usually received by the Risk Reduction Office within one to two weeks after administration. Upon receipt, a briefing with the Unit Commander will be scheduled to review the results. At this meeting the unit's "high risk" areas of concern will be discussed and a plan for prevention/intervention efforts will be developed.

As well as conducting URIs, the Risk Reduction Program also conducts R-URIs (Re-Integration Unit Risk Inventory Surveys) given to soldiers returning from deployment 90-180 days after their return. R-URI results provide valuable information to Commanders about significant or critical responses that may compromise unit readiness among redeployed soldiers.

Data Collection is maintained by designated staff agencies, in strict accordance with the following specifications, and provided to the RRP Coordinator monthly;

- By battalion/equivalent and, when applicable, by separate companies/equivalent;
- By total number of persons (not by name) -- as opposed to reporting "incidents," some of which might involve several persons, and
- Units/Soldiers assigned to shot groups.

DEFINITIONS AND REPORTING CONTACTS

- **AWOLs:** The total number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who are titled with AWOL by LE. (Do not include PCF Soldiers)

- **Drug Offenses:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who are titled with drug offenses by LE/CID. These include, but are not limited to, possession and sale (but NOT positive urinalysis) of a controlled substance and any other prohibited substance.

- **Alcohol Offenses:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who are titled with an alcohol-related offense by LE. This includes, but are not limited to, DUI, public intoxication, drunk and disorderly, reporting to work while intoxicated alcohol-related reckless driving, possession by a minor, and consumption by a minor. (These include alcohol as a secondary or tertiary offense.)

- **Traffic Violations:** The number of Soldiers titled with a moving traffic violations by LE. These include, but are not limited to, speeding, suspended license failure to obey a traffic device, accidents, and non-alcohol related reckless driving.

- **Crimes against Persons:** The number Soldiers Titled with crimes against persons.. These include, but are not limited to, simple assault, aggravated assault, robbery, kidnapping, harassment and threats, sodomy, rape, indecent assault, adultery, and forgery. (DO NOT include any of the Drug Offenses, Alcohol Offenses, Domestic or child abuse).

- **Crimes against Property:** The number of Soldiers titled with crimes against property. These include, but are not limited to, house breaking, arson, burglary, auto theft, theft of government property, theft of private property, intentional damage to property, and vandalism.

- **Crimes against Society:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who are titled with crimes against society by LE. These include, but are not limited to, concealed weapon, weapons violations, gambling, prostitution, curfew violations, and vagrancy.

- **Deaths:** The number of all Soldier deaths among members of the reporting unit. (DO NOT include deaths which occurred in theater.)

- **Accidents:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who are involved in a Class C or Class D accident.

Suicide Prevention:

- **Self Harm:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who have committed self-inflicted, potentially injurious behavior with a non-fatal outcome for which there is evidence (either explicit or implicit) of a lack of intent to die. (Do not count ideations.)

- **Suicide Attempts:** The number of suicide gestures and suicide attempts. The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who have committed self-inflicted, potentially injurious behavior with a non-fatal outcome for which there is evidence (either explicit or implicit) of intent to die. (Do not count ideations.)

- **UA Samples Tested:** The total number of urinalysis specimens tested at the Forensic Toxicology Drug Testing Laboratory. NOTE: The number of specimens collected might be higher than those tested at the laboratory because specimens must meet forensic specifications to be tested.

- **Positive UAs:** The number of confirmed positive urinalysis test results among members of reporting unit.

- **Warning Letters:** Total number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who have received letters notifying them that if inappropriate behavior continues, the consequence will be a loss of on-post housing.

- **Administrative Eliminations:** Total number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who were approved for separation from the Army in accordance with AR 635-200 and AR 600-8-24 (Chapters 5, 9, 10, 13, or 14 or Chapter 4 for officers).

- **Administrative Separations Initiated:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who had administrative separations initiated in accordance with AR 635-200 and AR 600-8-24 (Chapters 5, 9, 10, 13, or 14 or Chapter 4 for officers).

- **Courts Martial:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who were tried and found guilty by court-martial.

- **Disciplinary Actions:** Total number Soldiers in a reporting unit who received administrative disciplinary actions (non-judicial). These include, but are not limited to: non-judicial punishment under Article 15, UCMJ and a GO Memorandum of Reprimand.

Financial Readiness/AER:

- **Financial Problems/Risk:** The number of new cases of Soldiers from this reporting unit who either voluntarily or were command-directed for financial problems. This includes; writing bad checks, excessive debt, or inability to meet current financial obligations or had a debt-to income ratio of 40% or more.

- **Domestic Violence:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who have cases that meet the criteria for domestic violence, as defined in AR 608-18 (The Army Family Advocacy Program): applies in cases where the Soldier is identified as either the perpetrator or the victim. (This definition does not include child abuse. Also, do not count the Soldier under crimes against persons.)

- **Child Abuse:** The number of Soldiers in the reporting unit who are identified as the alleged perpetrator in cases that meet the criteria for the following offenses, as defined in AR 608-18: child abuse, child abuse/physical maltreatment, child emotional maltreatment, child neglect, and child physical maltreatment. (Do not include the Soldier under crimes against persons.)
